



Standard Operating Procedure (SOP) SEVERE WEATHER

Introduction

The purpose of this document is to provide guidance in the event of severe weather affecting the Retrieve service. It should be read with reference to Appendix 1, which provides a summary of the Met Office guidance on weather warnings.

Principle considerations

- Safety of the Retrieve team, BAEMS drivers and our patients is our primary focus. This means
 that there may be occasions when it is not possible to provide some, or all, elements of the
 service for a short period of time.
- Team members, drivers and the Leadership Team should dynamically assess risk and manage transfer referrals according to the principles outlined below.
- All team members should be prepared for severe weather and, if conditions are anticipated to change during a shift, travel with appropriate additional clothing (eg. warm weather jacket etc) in the ambulance when undertaking transfers.

Severe weather affecting staff

Many Retrieve team members live long distances from the operational bases. This means there is an increased likelihood of adverse weather causing travel disruption which, in turn, will impact service provision.

In the event of extreme weather preventing you travelling to work, you must do the following:

- Communicate with the Leadership Team as soon as you are able
- Communicate with other team members you are expecting to work with to ensure they are aware you are unable to travel to work

The Leadership Team on-call will:

- Communicate with other team members due on-shift and assess the likelihood of being able to provide a service. They will base this on:
 - Team member availability
 - Weather
 - Road conditions
- All reasonable attempts will be made to provide a Retrieve service, including:
 - Seeking alternate team members who live closer to base to cover the shift
 - Consulting voluntary agencies who may be able to aid staff journeys to work

Staff travelling long distances to operational bases may choose to stay at the operational base overnight rather than travel home in adverse weather conditions. Inflatable beds are available for this rare event.

Severe weather preventing vehicle movements

Consideration should be given to repositioning vehicles to the most accessible areas close to operational bases when severe weather is anticipated in order to allow mobilisation in difficult conditions.

If road and / or weather conditions prevent safe movement of vehicles, you must inform the Leadership Team SPOC as soon as you are able. They will:

- Liaise with BAEMS and voluntary agencies who may be able to provide alternative secondary vehicles.
- Inform South Western Ambulance Service NHS Foundation Trust (SWASFT) via Trust Incident Manager and inform them that referrals will be passed to them until Retrieve is available:
 - Primary contact: trustincidentmanager@swast.nhs.uk / 0300 303 4874.
 - Secondary contact: clinicalhubdutymanager@swast.nhs.uk / 0300 369 0093 (select either Hub and then option for Duty Manager).
- Inform the South West Critical Care Network and clinical colleagues that Retrieve's service may
 be delayed or unavailable in its usual format but that calls are still being accepted. Telephone
 or WhatsApp contact will be made so information can be cascaded.
- Inform other members of the Leadership Team so that resilience plans can be enacted.
- Inform the NHS England South West Regional Operations Centre and UHBW Division of Surgery or on-call manager (see 'Escalation and Communication' SOP for information).
- Review the provision of service every 3-6 hours and re-instate it as soon as deemed safe.
- Complete a DATIX.

If road and / or weather conditions affect a transfer that is in progress, the Retrieve 'Breakdown' SOP should be followed.

Road closures, bridge warnings and closures

Roads and bridges may be closed due to severe weather and this may directly affect routes to and from hospitals within the region. BAEMS drivers must communicate these in the Huddle at the start of each shift if the information is available or problems are anticipated.

Drivers should work with the team to plan an appropriate alternative route ahead of any transfer referral and this should be communicated to other teams using Siilo.

If a road or bridge closure is anticipated to affect response times, the Duty Consultant should communicate this with the referring hospital when the call is received. Delays should be documented on ARCEMS.

Appendix 1 – Guidance on weather warnings

The Met Office is the United Kingdom's national weather service. Retrieve will use Met Office warnings to instigate procedures to ensure service provision in the event of extreme weather.

Met Office weather warnings are categorised as follows:

Yellow

Yellow warnings can be issued for a range of weather situations. Many are issued when it is likely that the weather will cause low-level impact, including some disruption to travel. People may be able to continue with their daily routine, but there will be some that will be directly impacted and so it is important to assess if you could be affected.

Other yellow warnings are issued when the weather could bring much more severe impacts to the majority of people but the certainty of those impacts occurring is much lower.

It is important to read the content of yellow warnings to determine which weather situation is being covered by the yellow warning.

Amber

There is an increased likelihood of impacts from severe weather, which could potentially disrupt your plans. This means there is the possibility of travel delays, road and rail closures, power cuts and the potential risk to life and property. You should think about changing your plans and taking action to protect yourself and your property. You may want to consider the impact of the weather on your family and your community and whether there is anything you need to do ahead of the severe weather to minimise the impact.

Red

Dangerous weather is expected and, if you haven't already done so, you should take action now to keep yourself and others safe from the impact of the severe weather. It is very likely that there will be a risk to life, with substantial disruption to travel, energy supplies and possibly widespread damage to property and infrastructure. You should avoid travelling, where possible, and follow the advice of the emergency services and local authorities.

The Weather Impact Matrix provides a visual indication of the above warnings:
